The word 'harmonious' means 'like-minded', 'united in spirit'. It is an appeal that they will agree together to strive after loving unity. Sympathy He asks for sympathy. 'Let all of you be ... sympathetic' - responsive to each other's feelings and needs, tender-hearted towards each other. He asks for brotherliness. 'Show love of the brothers and sisters'. Brotherliness They must remember that they come from a family. There may be differences of temperament among them, but they must show familyunity, family-loyalty. He asks them to show compassion, merciful and tender feelings towards the needs and weaknesses of others. He asks for humility. 'Be ... humble in spirit'. They must not lord it over Humility each other or be rivals in competition, with each striving for superiority over the other. They are to be like Jesus who emptied Himself and humbled Himself. • Freedom from He asks for freedom from vindictiveness. 1 Peter 3:9 says 'Do not vindictiveness pay back evil for evil or insult for insult, but on the contrary bless the other person, for you were called to this in order that you may inherit a blessing'. They must face the fact that they are likely to face insult even from people who are closest to them - he has not long been speaking of wives and husbands - but they must deliberately and conscientiously set themselves against any spirit of retaliation or revenge. 2. He asks them to live for 'inheritance'. This is one of the major 2. Live for themes of the Bible. 'Inheritance' is reaping the blessings of godliness. 'inheritance' Christians are 'heirs' - people lined up for inheritance, people about to get a gracious reward. Peter has referred to this twice before^{m1}. ^{□1} 1:4; 3:7 • Reaping the Salvation is with a view to inheritance. Inheritance is not justification or blessings of new birth. It is what we are born again for. Christians are 'born again ... godliness in this for an inheritance ${}^{(\mu)}$. Inheritance is reaping the blessings of godliness. It ² 1:4 life and beyond begins in this life, since those who sow to the Spirit reap back from the Spirit. Yet it also involves reward beyond the grave. We lay up treasure in heaven. Inheritance comes by works of persistent faith. References to • Works of persistent faith 'inheritance' nearly always follow appeals for godly living. Here in 1 Peter 3:7, 8–12 it comes in an appeal for godly living. Inheritance is not 'by faith Hebrews alone'; it is by 'faith and patience'¹¹. 6:12 3. 'They will scarcely brood over the days of their lives' - says Ecclesiastes 5:20 - 'because God keeps them occupied with the joy of their hearts'. But how can we know such joy? Peter – following Psalm 37 – has two negative points and two positive Two negatives points. and two We are to restrain our talk. The happy life begins with restraining the positives thing that brings most destructiveness and sorrow - a wild tongue, careless lips. This is the most difficult aspect of the human personality to control. How do we do it? It is easier when we believe in the sovereignty Restrain talk of God! When we talk wildly it is largely because we are trying to achieve something ourselves instead of letting God do it. But we must learn not to try to shape life by wild talk. We are to turn from evil. When God shows us that something is Turn from evil wrong, as He will, we deliberately and conscientiously turn from it, and put the opposite in its place. We turn from deceit and practise openness. We turn from defensiveness and leave our reputation with God. We turn from envy and deliberately find our contentment in God. We turn from vindictiveness and deliberately let the other person ill-treat us. It is painful - but it brings us liberty and release when we do it! We are to do what is good. In every situation we find out what is the good thing to do. It will always involve loving the other person. Then we do it! It is not purely a negative life of self-restraint. It is positively and Do what is good actively following God's leading and doing what is good. We are to pursue peace. We seek for ways of having peace. We will not Pursue peace compromise with sin - it is not peace at any price. But it is peace so far as it depends on us. We pursue it! This implies that peace is often running away from us! You only have to chase what is running away!

• A wonderful result – God looks after us

The result is wonderful. The fruit of the Spirit is love (that first!), then joy and peace and the consciousness of being in control of our lives. Then we love life; we discover that we are seeing good days. If we live in any other way, God is against us. Best of all we discover that God looks after us when we cease to look after ourselves so much. The eyes of the Lord are on the righteous, and He hears our prayers.
