Preaching Through The Bible Michael Eaton Isaiah Transformations (29:15-24)

Isaiah has at this point six sections beginning with the word 'Ah' or 'Ah, how terrible . . .'. 'Ah! That crown of pride . . .' ¹¹. 'Ah, Ariel, Ariel, the city where David settled!' ¹². Now we come to the third 'Ah'.

Isaiah is still referring to the time when Judah sent messengers to Egypt asking for their protection against Assyria. They were rejecting God's word to them through Isaiah¹¹. Going to Egypt was foolish and yet God promised he would rescue them¹². Now Isaiah ponders the way in which people turn things upside down but God turns them the right way up!

1. Men and women turn things upside down.

¹⁵Ah, how terrible for those who go to great depths to hide their plans from Yahweh. Their works are done in darkness, and they say, 'Who sees us? Who knows about us?'
¹⁶How you turn things upside down! It is as if the potter were thought to be like the clay! Shall what is formed say to him who formed it, 'He did not make me'? Can the pot say of the potter, 'He does not discern anything'?

Sin is so deceitful! We deceive ourselves. We deceive others, sometimes in a most 'spiritual' manner, and we even act as if we can deceive God! But when we act in a deceitful manner we do so because our conscience is not clear in what we are doing. We are acting as if we had the right to do what we like. We – the clay pot that God is shaping – somehow think we can argue with or deceive our Creator!

2. But God can also bring about great changes as well! If men and women turn things upside down God turns them the right way up again.

¹⁷ In a very short time, Lebanon will be turned into a garden land and the fertile field will obviously be a forest.

The Bible's way of facing the future is to look to the very end of what God is planning to do. It looks far ahead to 'that day' when salvation and judgement will come. Creation itself will be totally healed. Even the best (beautiful Lebanon) will be made even better. Fertile fields will become lush forests, as will be plain to everyone.

Deafness and blindness will disappear.

¹⁸ In that day the deaf will hear the words of the scroll, and out of gloom and darkness the eyes of the blind will see.

• Great spiritual wisdom

• Submission to God's instruction

• Turnaround

The much-changed life of God's people will include a new steadiness in which previously unreliable people come to great spiritual wisdom, and those who have before been grumblers and complainers submit to God's instruction and so change their ways.

The three paragraphs of this section of Isaiah¹¹ have all considered some kind of turnaround: those who turn upside down their relationship to God; the God who acts to turn us around so that our relationship to him is right; and the newness of life that appears in God's people when he rescues us from our upside-down ways of living.
