 Troubles help us to pray The background to Psalm 17 	Troubles help us to pray! In 1 Samuel 23:25-29 Saul is hunting for David. David tries to escape by running into the wilderness of Maon, but still Saul pursues him. At one point Saul and his men were only a short distance behind David, when suddenly Saul received a message which demanded his attention elsewhere ¹¹ . So David escaped. Maybe this was the background to Psalm 17. Certainly it is clear in Psalm 17 that David is again in some terrible crisis with enemies threatening his life ¹² . They are to be found all around him ¹³ watching his every move ¹⁴ , eager to destroy him utterly ¹⁵ . They act with craftiness ¹⁶ , with cruelty and with no concern for consequences. 1. Prayer is based upon a claim to righteousness	Prayer is based upon a claim to righteousness . What do you do when you are in extremely bad trouble? You learn to pray in the name of Jesus.  (i) David is representing the coming Saviour. David is praying as the righteous King Jesus 	(i) David is representing the coming Saviour. God's king is really Jesus. David had amazing glimpses into the future and could speak of a coming Priest-king a thousand years before it happened (as in Psalm 110)! He is acting as if he were the coming King with a perfect righteousness. It is Jesus who can say 'Which one of you can convict me of sin?' [□] ¹ . David is praying as a righteous king. Its application in our lives is that we have to pray in the name of Jesus. It is only Jesus who has a perfect righteousness.	^{□¹ John 8:46}
(ii) God is likely to answer our prayers when we are seeking to be like	(ii) God is likely to answer our prayers when we are seeking to be like Jesus. David at times has to confess his sins. He is not claiming that his overall status before God is through his own righteousness ¹¹ . Our 'justification' (to use Paul's term) is without works.	Psalm 32:5; Romans 4:6- 8
 God honours his people when they maintain sincerity and a peace- making style of life amidst controversy 	Yet it is still true that our sincerity is important. David likes to keep his conscience clear. He is able to say to God, 'Lord, so far as I know I am righteous and sincere in this particular controversy between me and my enemy'. The conflicts mentioned in the psalms arise out of David's troubles with Saul and with Absalom. In both cases he knew that he had not specially sinned against his enemy, and he expected God to bless him accordingly. God honours his people when they maintain sincerity and a peace-making style of life amidst controversy. David can claim his cause is right.
